Friends of Cyrus opens Day Program for adults with developmental disabilities in Middlesex County, NJ (Dayton)

Dayton, NJ – (Friends of Cyrus – February, 2020) - Friends of Cyrus (FOC), a New Jersey based service provider for adults with developmental disabilities, proudly announces the opening of its newest Adult Day Habilitation.

Based in Middlesex County, the new location will offer structured, center-based and community-based programming for up to 40 individuals in 7,000 square feet of space — providing opportunities for enrichment in all aspects of functional skills. Participants are offered a variety of purposeful activities to engage in, including community service.

The new day program adds to a wide range of services currently offered by FOC throughout New Jersey, including children’s and adult in-home services, eighteen community residences, a children’s ABA clinic (also in Middlesex county), and it’s South Jersey Adult Day Program; situated in Medford, NJ.



When an individual joins the agency, FOC’s team conducts personalized assessments and plans for each participant, working with individuals and family members every step of the way. Programmatic goals focus on basic living skills, communication, community participation, behavior support, pre-vocational skill development, supported employment and much more.

FOC is thrilled to open its newest location in Middlesex County — adding much needed services to a county whose leadership has embraced supporting individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The program will open its doors on March 16th, 2020. **A formal open house will commence on April 24th, from 11 am to 4pm**, with refreshments provided.
